ANNUAL CONCERT

June 11, 2022

On June 11, 2022, Love in Music (LM) celebrated its 15th anniversary through a concert with over 200 people including all volunteers and students from its three branches in L.A., Santa Ana, and South Bay.

Sarang Community Church, located in Anaheim, graciously opened its doors to Love in Music for the sixth time since May 2007 with the Main Worship Hall serving as the concert venue.

Three hours before the concert, the Love in Music family celebrated its 15th birthday by sharing a special meal together. The volunteer's parent support group helped prepare this special gathering and also held a cake-cutting ceremony until the students and teachers were dispersed for the final dress rehearsal.

The Love in Music Volunteer (LMV) Ensemble opened the concert with pieces including Scarlatti's Sinfonia, Bach's Air from Orchestral Suite #3, and Pachelbel's Canon in D. Their performance was followed by four professional guest performances by Dr. Kangwon Lee Kim, Violinist & Music Director of Love in Music, Dr. Li-shan Hung, Professor of Piano at Biola University, Prof. Young Dae Kwon, Pastor & Baritone Soloist, and Dr.

Hyunjung Hwang, Composer & Director of the Doctoral Program at California Arts University.

Overwhelmed by the richness and beauty of the classical music performed by these wonderful artists, the audience, after facing hardships through the pandemic, enjoyed not only the top-quality music but a great time of healing together with the community.

Another highlight of the concert was the 2nd part of the program presented by our very own LM students, with each of the three branches prepared a 20-minute performance. They played wonderfully with pride and confidence, displaying what they had worked on for months. Their teachers could not have been more proud of them, and their hard work throughout the semester was highly applauded by the whole crowd.

Before the performances, Love in Music presented a video featuring its founding background and history, along with eight congratulatory recordings from community leaders, including Rep. Michelle P. Steel, U.S. Congress of District 43, and John Lee, L.A. City Councilmember of District 12.

After presenting certificates of appreciation to graduates of Class 2022 and community leader awards to outstanding volunteers, the event came to a close with a finale piece by the LMV Ensemble. Together, they performed "My Heart Will Go On," a love theme from Titanic, arranged by Dr. Hyunjung Hwang who accompanied them on the piano.

As the learning classical instruments calls for patience and extra motivation, Love in Music has consistently hosted an annual concert 13 years (excluding 2020 and 2021 due to the pandemic) at the end of each school year since 2008. Love in Music and all of the volunteers hope that by hosting annual concerts, all participating students will feel motivated to keep learning and appreciate quality classical music by watching guest performances and presenting themselves before the audience.

Love in Music is currently operated in three locations including Los Angeles, Santa Ana and Torrance, CA, and has just completed the volunteer registration for SY 2022-23.

Although the violin has been an integral part of my life since I was young, I never gave much thought to the gift of music until joining Love in Music in my freshman year. Before, I "went through the motions" of playing the violin, and, admittedly, there were times when

it even felt like a chore. Working with the students at Love in Music each week helped me realize that music is more than just an end product; it is a shared experience that can touch the hearts of many, no matter their skill level or background.

Coming into Love in Music as a shy freshman, it was difficult to become comfortable around so many students. Many of the techniques I knew were hard to explain in words. ## Fall/Spring Volunteer Training Seminars

During the 2021-22 Season of Love in Music, two volunteer training sessions were held for new and returning volunteers from Santa Ana, Los Angeles, and South Bay Branches in September and January respectively. Dr. Kangwon Lee Kim, Music Director of Love in Music, led both sessions, sharing advice on achieving effective music instruction and facilitating discussions amongst student volunteers in hopes of inspiring them to further their love for teaching. All participants were able to gain valuable insight on the intersections of children's education and instrumental music from seasoned musicians



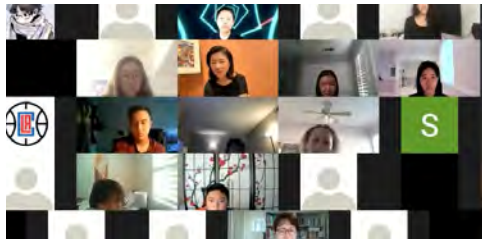

Suzuki's observations, Dr. Kim stated confidently that, "any child and any person can learn an instrument with pleasure and enjoy being good at it." As the volunteers were reminded back to the title of Love in Music with the phrase 'Love is the name of the game', they were encouraged to not only focus on developing technical musical skill within their students but foster a strong love for the art of music itself and a long-lasting desire to create their own beautiful sound. Later on in the session, volunteers were given a chance to share some of the obstacles they had encountered while teaching. Angie Lee, a first-year volunteer, expressed that she felt a bit hesitant planning lessons and gauging the skill level of her new student. In response, Dr. Kim recommended using a structured practice book to encourage steady progress and repetition of newly learned skills.

The January Volunteer Training Session saw a slight expansion with the introduction of Lisette Kielson and Melody Lee, professional

instrumental music advisors in flute and piano respectively. In addition to Dr. Kim's general tips on efficiently conducting lessons, Lisette Kielson shared the importance of working with unique personalities and connecting with students on a more meaningful level. "I love asking [my students]: What do you want to get out of this?", she stated. Melody Lee introduced the concept of teaching creatively and tapping into children's sensory sides to allow instrumental music to be a more engaging experience.

With both volunteer training sessions, LM volunteers across all branches were able to learn about new and innovative ways to teach music, as well as share their own teaching experiences with each other. As Love in Music volunteers continue to guide their students, the philosophy of teaching not only music, but love and dedication, is likely to stay with them and influence their way of understanding musical education. *(Reported by Isabel Hahn, OCSA-Violin)*

### LM Bylaws/Guidelines for President Volunteer Service Award

Love in Music is an authorized non-profit organization to award volunteers with President Volunteer Service Award (PVSA) based on the following bylaws adopted by the board of Love in Music, effective July 2013.

1. LM-PVSA application is processed annually for period starting from the 1st day of the fall semester to the last day of the spring semester of the following year, and the service period is subject to change in case of national emergency or any unexpected change in the ordinance of the Federal-State Governments.

2. Only eligible volunteers may apply for PVSA based on the following: (1) Only active and enrolled volunteers of Love in Music during the service period, whose attendance rate is 75% or above; (2) Total annual service hours may differ from one branch to another.

3. In case the total service hours with Love in Music fall short of the PVSA requirements among the eligible volunteers, Love in Music allows

them to add community service hours earned from other verifiable non-profit organizations during the service period.

4. LM PVSA Application, with all supporting documents, will be submitted by email directly on due date as announced by Love in Music each year. Application submitted after due date will not be accepted.

5. Final winners of PVSA will be announced individually and the certificate of PVSA with medal or pin will be given at each branch's award presentation meeting, as community leader award to outstanding volunteers whose attendance rate in the community service with Love in Music is higher than 75%.

6. Love in Music certifies community service hours for high school volunteers based on the following:

(1) Attendance at the weekly lessons or related support services is credited for a total of 3 hours per week (2 hours for lesson or support services and 1 hour for class prep or related duties as assigned by Love in Music);

(2) Attendance at Mini Winter Concert is credited for 4 hours, and Annual Concert for

max. 8 hours, including time for coaching and performing as members of the LMV ensemble or as stage coordinators, including time for setting up and tearing down of the event.

(3) Participation in any special programs or community events and volunteer training programs organized by Love in Music for 2 - 4 hours, depending on the length of each event.
